Dear Dmitry Anatolyevich,

My colleagues and I, as well as our relatives, are being murdered. What's more, this is being accomplished by rather depraved methods. I suspect that this is being carried out by a group of persons from the federal security forces of the Russian Federation. The following facts have led me to arrive at this conclusion.

While residing in Moscow, at 8 Novoorlovskaya Street, Building 1, Apt. 97, my girlfriend, Olga Vladimirovna Skorbatyuk and I, experienced a number of unusual health problems for quite a significant period of time. Our poor health could not be relieved by taking any medications, and our physicians were at a loss to identify the underlying causes of our illnesses. Strangely, our symptoms were, to a large degree, similar. Our health condition continued to worsen, finally reaching a point when neither one of us was able to work; additionally, I had also developed acute shortness of breath.

In early October of 2010, we began suspecting that our deteriorating health was not caused by ordinary illness.

One of the reasons that gave rise to our suspicions was the fact that, after reviewing our complaints, our internist suggested that we see occupational physicians and toxicologists, based on her suspicion that we were suffering from poisoning by an unknown poison (please see "Physician referral form" in the Attachment). Another reason for our suspicion was the accidental discovery that the front door of our apartment had been forced open. This was discovered when a portion of the door lock fell on the floor as we were leaving our apartment. Repair of that lock and its careful examination led us to conclude that there had been a break-in.

On January 4, 2011 we filed a complaint with the Novo-Peredelkino District Department of Internal Affairs, stating that our apartment had been broken into by unknown persons. A police response unit was dispatched to the scene, along with our local Precinct Inspector, Aleksey Yuriyevich Nadirov. Department of Criminal Investigations Detective, Senior Lieutenant Vitaliy Igorievich Fonaryov and Second Lieutenant Andrei Borisovich Zhelezko were also present at the scene and took down our complaint (please see "Complaint to the Department of Internal Affairs No. 1" and "Notice of Receipt No. 129"). Senior Inspector N. E. Tokareva, Police Major with the Novo-Peredelkino Department of Internal Affairs, took away both locks for forensic

analysis, including the lock which, in the officer's opinion, had simply fallen apart on its own (while we were certain that the lock had been jimmed).

When we realized that our apartment had been broken into we contacted the Moscow Center for Hygiene and Epidemiology of the Federal Healthcare Agency (FHA), with an urgent request to test our premises. The test results were shocking not just to us, but to the experts as well. They determined the presence of certain chemical substances in our home at levels that were hazardous to human life. In particular, the maximum permissible concentration (MPC) levels in a residential dwelling (room) far exceeded the norm as follows:

- **Dibutyl phthalates: by nearly 10 times** ( samples of the carpet which was moved from the room to be aired out on the balcony due to a strange odor in the room);
- **Styrols: by 5.5 times** (in an area next to our sleeping area);
- **Formaldehyde: by 3 times** (also next to our bed);
- and levels of **“Volatile components of an odorant compound” exceeded the MPC almost by 34 times** (also next to the bed).

Air samples in the closet showed styrol levels that were 8 times greater than the MPC, **naphthalene levels that were 7 times greater than the MPC, while levels of volatile components of an odorant compound were 40 times greater than the MPC** (please see attached reports: Report No. GTSP23 2011 of 1/17/2011, Report No. 18 of 1/26/2011 and Report No. 18 of 1/26/2011 [sic<sup>1</sup>]).

It is also worth noting that the staff of the Moscow Center for Hygiene and Epidemiology of the FHA informed us that such levels could not be have been related to apartment furniture (which had been there for at least 15 years) or to any apartment remodeling or repairs, the last of which took place over 6 years ago. They also verbally informed us that in their entire experience of working at this organization they had never encountered anything like that at a residential dwelling. For instance, the high levels of volatile components of an odorant compound that they discovered could only be found at perfume factories. They also took air samples outside our window, but did not find anything that could have caused such high indoor concentrations.

Additionally, we had submitted a portion of our carpet for analysis (please see Invoice No. 1138 of 1/28/2011). However, three weeks have now passed without any test results issued by the Moscow Center for Hygiene and Epidemiology of the FHA. We were informed by telephone (during our conversation with A. U. Poltoratsky, Head of the Laboratory of Chemistry and Physics Research), that traces of phthalates had been found, but that they were unable to formally offer any expert opinion because they were once again at a complete loss as to the results.

While our apartment was being tested, we also continued undergoing medical testing. A medical test revealed **rather high concentrations of heavy metals in my**

**blood, which significantly exceeded normal levels: lead - by 40%, cadmium – by 20 %** (please see clinical laboratory test results from Dialab Laboratory). It is worth noting that these tests were performed after I had undergone the first comprehensive blood purification procedure (cascade plasmapheresis) at the Medsi Clinic (please see attached “Case Record of A. N. Davydov by attending physician of the Medsi Clinic” and “Case Record of O.V. Skorbatyuk by attending physician of the Medsi Clinic”).

Additionally, medical tests showed that **at the present time my bronchi had lost over 70% of their function** (please see Spirometry of A. N. Davydov, attached). I'd like to point out that, after I visited a number of specialists and had undergone a number of additional tests and evaluations (i.e. sputum analysis, ultrasound of the heart, etc.), it was determined that there was no connection between the fits of severe shortness of breath (bronchial spasms) and bronchial asthma. Similarly, no serious heart condition (ischemia, etc.), diabetes or allergies were found. It therefore followed that my ailments were caused exclusively by the impact of poisonous substances upon my body. This conclusion was verbally confirmed during my conversation with one of the health inspectors from the Moscow Center of Hygiene and Epidemiology of the FHA.

Medical tests also showed **heightened levels of cholinesterase, by 30%** (please see Invitro Laboratory test results, attached).

Some time earlier, Olga Vladimirovna Skorbatyuk was diagnosed with having a number of benign tumors (please see attached medical records). O.V. Skorbatyuk's daughter, Elena Yuryevna Skorbatyuk, presented symptoms that were also similar to ours, namely, heaviness in the chest, difficulty breathing, seizures, unusual drowsiness, weakness, limb tremor, pain in the gastrointestinal tract region, edema, burning and redness in the eyes, problems with vision, skin problems and so on.

After all of the abovementioned facts were discovered, and we had obtained documentary evidence thereof, the owner of the contaminated apartment, O. V. Skorbatyuk, filed a police complaint (please see “Complaint to the Department of Internal Affairs № 2”, “Notice of Receipt No. 989”). However, there was absolutely no response from the Novo-Peredelkino Department of Internal Affairs. None of the police officers expressed any concern that residents of their precinct were more or less being murdered. We were offered no assistance in protecting our lives. Moreover, no investigations were initiated in response to our two complains. The two complaints were not reviewed jointly; meanwhile the results of forensics analysis of the lock are still unavailable (despite the fact that it has now been nearly two months). The first complaint resulted in denial and a refusal to open a criminal case (Notice of Denial is not attached, since, for the past two weeks, we have been unable to receive it, by mail or in person, from our local Precinct Inspector). As for the second complaint, its resolution has been pending for the past month, despite the fact that, by law, complaints must be reviewed within three days (this complaint was filed on January 28, 2011), and, although it has now been nearly a month, there have been no news from the police. All this has occurred despite the fact that we have sent letters to Anatoliy Viktorovich Mitrofanov, Chief of Novo-Peredelkino Department of Internal Affairs (please see letter dated January 29,

2011), as well as a letter to the Solntsevo Interdistrict Prosecutor's Office (please see letter dated January 28, 2011).

I believe that it is important to emphasize that neither I, nor any of my colleagues or relatives, have ever violated any law, had any charges brought against us or have had any contact with any criminal organizations. Our lives and our careers have been solely dedicated to scientific research, on the basis of which we have been compiling the Catalog of Human Population ([www.catalogofhumanpopulation.org](http://www.catalogofhumanpopulation.org)). I have also never had any close contact with any members of the Russian Special Forces, with the exception of meeting Andrei Dmitriyevich Polonchuk, Lieutenant Colonel of the Foreign Intelligence Service, in 2000. He was interested in my research for the Catalog of Human Population. This acquaintance was severed in 2005, due to my unwillingness to maintain further contact with this person.

My colleagues and I tried to come up with all kind of different hypotheses as to the possible and actual identity of our assassins, and eventually arrived at the conclusion that this was not our job, but the job for appropriate professionals. I am referring to officers of the Ministry of Internal Affairs and other agencies. But as it turned out, in reality these professionals are waiting for the end result of this crime, in other words, for our dead bodies. Our dead bodies! Only then will they commence their investigation. This is the only explanation for the fact that, for the past two months, none of the law enforcement officers have expressed the slightest interest in whether or not we were still alive. All of this occurred despite the existence of documentary evidence which clearly demonstrates that an entire group of people is being subjected to horrendous persecution, that we have been targeted and that someone is trying to kill us!

Needless to say, we are not particularly excited by the prospect of being turned into corpses so that those who are bound by professional duty to protect us can finally address our case. We would prefer to survive this situation and to put an end to the act of terrorism perpetrated against us. I classify everything that is happening to us as an act of terrorism against peaceful Russian citizens, because all of the abovementioned facts and attached documents prove that such actions could not have been undertaken by self-taught amateurs. I believe that it would take special professional expertise and skill to create such "cocktails" from a number of chemical compounds. This is exactly why I am inclined to believe that we are being terrorized by the Special Forces of the Russian Federation.

I am asking you to conduct an investigation of our complaint and inform us of the results via e-mail, because as of February 11, 2011, because as of February 11, 2011, we have been forced to abandon our home due to the fact that someone had turned our apartment into a gas chamber. At the present time, O. V. Skorbatyuk and I are forced to seek shelter with various friends and acquaintances, despite our very real concern that some other harmful substance may be planted in our apartment now that no one is watching it. At the same time, we realize that your email response might not reach us, because our computers have recently started acting very strangely: our e-mail accounts have been broken into, e-mail messages got readdressed, messages have been stolen,

other e-mail messages didn't reach us and messages sent to and from our website have also not been functioning properly. I am not providing you with our phone numbers because I suspect that all my telephone lines (both home and cellular), as well as those of my colleagues, are being monitored, blocked or used. All this is spite of the fact that Article 8 of the Federal Statute No.40 of April 3, 1995, "Regarding Federal Security Service", mandates that one of the main activities of the Federal Security Agency should be the fight against terrorism and crime, and we are in no way associated with either. We are peaceful Russian citizens engaged in scientific research and we ask for your intervention in this matter.

I hope for your understanding, your assistance and protection.
